Ambassador Alfred Leroy Atherton, Jr., served as Executive Director, Una Chapman Cox Foundation in Washington, DC until 1998. Ambassador Atherton is also the Senior Advisor to the Director of Harkness Fellowship of the Commonwealth Fund of New York. Ambassador Atherton's distinguished career with the Foreign Service included posts as Ambassador to Egypt; Ambassador at Large for Middle East Negotiation; and Assistant Secretary of State for the Near East and South Asia. He also authored articles on Middle East subjects which have appeared in *Foreign Policy*, *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *The International Herald Tribune*, as well as other journals and newspapers. Ambassador Atherton is also the author of "Egypt and US Interests" a Policy Brief, published by the Foreign Policy Institute of the School of Advanced International Studies of The Johns Hopkins University. He received both his BS and MA from Harvard University. Ambassador Atherton is the recipient of Superior and Distinguished Federal Civilian Service Award, and The National Civil Service Award.

Betty Wylie Atherton previously taught in Damascus International School, Potomac School, National Cathedral School for Girls and Lab School of Washington in Washington, DC. She worked with and advised Egyptian teachers of learning disabled children, directed the English Language Program for USIS in Calcutta and, in Cairo, tutored learning disabled students, organized and directed a Summer Study Skills Program for Junior High students. After retiring from teaching, she was a consultant and Assistant to the Vice President for Finance and Personnel at Creative Associates International, Inc. Dr. Goodman has published more than 100 books, chapters and articles on international affairs. Dr. Goodman also serves as a consultant to the Ford Foundation and the US Information Agency on increasing representation of minorities in public policy and international affairs careers.

From 1996-1999, he served as Ambassador to the Kingdom of Thailand from 1996-1999. Prior to his appointment to Bangkok, Ambassador Itoh served as Executive Secretary of the National Security Council at the White House from 1993-1995. Earlier he had served as Deputy Executive Secretary and Acting Executive Secretary of the Department of State. A career member of the Senior Foreign Service, Ambassador Itoh has held a number of positions in the Department of State and Abroad. His overseas tours have included assignments as the US Consul General to Western Australia in Perth (1986-1990) and as a Consular and Political Officer in the US Embassy in London (1976-1978). His Washington assignments have included the Office of Under Secretary for Political Affairs, the Bureau of East Asian and Pacific Affairs, and the Bureau of Congressional Relations. Ambassador Itoh holds a BA in Social Science from the University of New Mexico and MA in History and Anthropology from the same institution. He has also been a secondary school teacher in Albuquerque public schools an Assistant Professor of History at California State University in Humboldt, California, and a former Air Force officer.
