Addilyn Perry Chams-Eddine, currently pursues a Master of Arts in Global Finance, Trade and Economic Integration, with Concentrations in Economic Development, and International Economics. The recipient of several scholarships, including a Social Science Foundation Scholarship and Compton Fellowship from the Institute for the Study of World Politics, as well as a member of several academic honor societies: Ms Chams-Eddine is Assistant to Professor Thomas Rowe, Director of the International Career Advancement Program (ICAP) at the University of Denver. Ms Chams-Eddine attained a BA degree, Magna Cum Laude in Sociology and Spanish from the Metropolitan State College of Denver.

MariaPinto Carland, currently serves as Associate Director of the Master of Science in Foreign Service Program for the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. Ms. Pinto Carland has been with MSFS since 1985. Prior to joining the School of Foreign Service, Ms. Pinto Carland was an administrator at the Patterson School of International Commerce and Diplomacy and the University of Toronto Graduate History Department. She has held posts as Curatorial Assistant at the Metropolitan Museum, the Art Gallery of Ontario, and the University of Kentucky Art Museum. She has also been a Program Officer at the US-United Nations Association and the Foreign Policy Association. Ms. Pinto Carland was the first Chair of the Career Officers' Committee of the Association of Professional Schools of International Affairs (APSIA). She is editor of the 1991 and 1997 editions of *Careers in International Affairs*. Ms. Pinto Carland holds a BA in English/History from Marymount Manhattan College, did graduate work in African Studies at New York University, and holds an MA in Liberal Studies from Georgetown University.

George A. Dalley currently is involved with the creation and building of DC Air. Prior to beginning his current endeavor this year he was a partner with Holland and Knight in Washington, DC practicing in the areas of legislative, administrative and international law. George DeMartino is an Associate Professor at the Graduate School of International Studies at the University of Denver. He received his Ph.D. in economics from the University of Massachusetts, Amherst in 1992, and his M.A. degree in industrial relations from Warwick University (England) in 1982. Dr. DeMartino has served as an Assistant Professor at Dickinson College, Visiting Lecturer at Trinity College, and Staff Representative and Consultant to the American Federation of State, County, and Municipal Employees, AFL-CIO. Prior to assuming his current duties in 1997, Mr. Gadsden served three year as the Deputy Chief of Mission, American Embassy Budapest, Hungary. He spent 1993-1994 with the State Department in Senior Seminar. During 1989-1994 he was Counselor for Economic Affairs, American Embassy, Paris, France. The previous four years Mr. Gadsden had served as an Economic/Political Officer, U.S. Mission to the European Community in Brussels Belgium. He was a European Community Desk Officer with the State Department from 1981-1984. Mr. Gadsden was Staff Assistant to the Assistant Secretary of State for Economic and Business Affairs from 1980-1981. He spent two years as a Commercial Officer with the American Embassy in Budapest Hungary. The prior two years were also with the American Embassy, yet in Taipei, Taiwan as a Trade Promotion Officer. Mr. Gadsden served as a State Department Political Officer for East Asian Regional Affairs from 1972-1974. He received a B.A., cum laude, from Harvard University in 1970. And a M.A. in East Asian (Chinese) Studies from Stanford University in 1972. Mr. Gadsden attended Princeton University Advanced Economic Studies 1984-1985.

She specializes in international finance and financial policy, financial systems and economic development, and financial crisis in emerging economies.

Ambassador William H. Itoh, is currently Ambassador in Residence at the Kenan Institute of the University of North Carolina. He previously served as Executive Secretary of the Overseas Presence Advisory Panel which presented its recommendations on the composition, location and staffing of American Embassies abroad to the Secretary of State in November 1999. From 1996-1999 he served as Ambassador to the Kingdom of Thailand. Prior to his appointment to Bangkok, Ambassador Itoh served as Executive Secretary of the National Security Council at the White House from 1993-1995. A career member of the Senior Foreign Service, Ambassador Itoh has held a number of positions in the Department of State and abroad. His overseas tours have included assignments as the US Consul General to Western Australia in Perth (1986-1990) and as a Consular and Political Officer in the US Embassy in London (1976-1978). His Washington assignments have included the Office of Under Secretary for Political Affairs, the Bureau of East Asian and Pacific Affairs, and the Bureau of Congressional Relations. He also served as Deputy Executive Secretary and Acting Executive Secretary of the Department of State, 1991-1993. Ambassador Itoh attended the University of New Mexico and received a BA in Social Science and an MA in History and Anthropology. He has also been a secondary school teacher in the Albuquerque public schools, an Assistant Professor of History at California State University in Humboldt, California, and a former Air Force officer.

Charlotte G. Kea is an experienced professional specializing in international business development. In 1999, she formed a consulting company, most recently supporting WorldTel Satellite Services and the Rainbow/PUSH Coalition. Prior to his appointment, he was professor of law at the University of Denver College of Law. A graduate of Indiana University School of Law, Justice Scott served as a trial attorney in the US Securities and Exchange Commission, served as an arbitrator for the National Association of Securities Dealers, Inc., and was a member of the faculty of the Annual Institute on Securities Regulation of the Practicing Law Institute in New York. Justice Scott serves on the National Board of the Constituency for Africa.

Cherri D. Waters is the Vice President of Programs for Lutheran World Relief. She is the former Vice President for Public Policy and External Affairs for InterAction, a coalition of more than 160 US-based non-profits working to promote human dignity and development in 165 countries around the world.
